Back to School

It was lovely to welcome our young people back to school after the summer holidays. As always, some of them seem to have grown several inches over the summer! Our new S1 pupils have made a good start and there have been lots of smiling faces though the week and excited chat about new subjects and experiences. Year group assemblies were held on Wednesday, and Mrs McKay used these to talk about the learning opportunities on offer in the school and the importance of being open to new ideas and approaches. Young people were also reminded (or introduced to in the case of S1!) our school values – Respect, Learning, Confidence, Opportunity and Community – and the fact that we are all part of one team, Team Porty.

Exam Success

We are pleased and proud to report that our overall exam performance was very positive last year. As always, there have been some outstanding individual performances and a number of departments have seen improvements. While data is still provisional, early indications show that we have had our best ever results for the number of S4 pupils who achieved five or more awards at National 5 with 51% achieving five or more awards at A-C. We also had a best ever result for the number of young people achieving 5 Highers at A-C by the end of S5 with 18%. Attainment in S6 also improved across the board. Against the backdrop of a our school move and inspection, this is a real testament to the hard work of both young people and staff and the support of parents.
