Granny Cameron's Oven Wheaten

1 cup plain flour

1 cup wheat meal flour

1 tsp baking soda

½ tsp salt

2 tsp caster sugar

2 oz hard margarine or butter

1 egg

Buttermilk approx. half a cup *

* Lots of easy recipes online about how to make your own, if needed

Method:

- 1. Rub margarine/butter into dry ingredients until you have an even breadcrumb consistency
- 2. Beat egg and slowly stir into the dry mix
- 3. Add enough buttermilk to make a fairly firm dough
- 4. Minimal kneading required; pop dough into a loaf tin or shape into a cob and place on baking tray.
- 5. Bake in a hot oven for about 30 mins
